



## Development Spotlight: Sandhill Parkway Townhomes

It's likely you've noticed some big changes along the Southeast corner of Viking Boulevard and Highway 65 in recent months. This summer brought an exciting milestone for the development of this corner: the opening of the first phase of the Sandhill Parkway Townhomes. Under development since 2021, this townhome community is home to 105 two- and three-bedroom units. At the center of this community is a clubhouse, offering amenities such as an outdoor pool, fitness center, community room, grilling and patio area, and pet grooming station. In addition to these amenities, new residents are enjoying the community's sidewalks, proximity to East Bethel's natural areas, and the convenience of Highway 65. As of August, the development was 31% leased, with interest in the community growing as contractors complete landscaping and other finishing touches. As the Highway 65 corridor continues to evolve, the Sandhill Parkway Townhomes and its residents are poised to enjoy all East Bethel has to offer.

## Autumn Leaf Disposal

Fall is here, which means leaves will be falling and covering your yard. After leaves fall, they break down into nutrients that replenish the soil. But if there is no soil, those nutrients will end up in storm drains and enter directly into lakes, rivers, and streams. Excess nutrients contribute to unwanted algae growth, which can degrade the health of our waters. Here are some tips for fall leaves:

- Don't blow leaves off your yard into the street – this is illegal and clogs storm drains, which can cause flooding.
- Compost leaves – do not throw them away.
- Do not dump leaves or other yard waste into ditches or wetlands.
- Mulch leaves with your mower and leave them on your yard or add them to garden beds.
- Clean up leaves along the street, curb, and any nearby storm drains.

## Snow and Ice Removal

Snowplow operators try to evenly distribute the snow along the route, but in some instances limited space can make this difficult. For safer streets and faster, more thorough service, our snowplow drivers urge you to remember:



- No Parking on any public street from November 1 to March 31 between the hours of 11:00 pm and 6:00 am.
- No Parking on any public street after a 2 inch snowfall, as determined by the Public Works Manager, between the hours of 6:00 am and 6:00 pm until the road has been plowed the full width.
- Keep a safe distance from the snowplow. They can weigh 17 times more than the average car and frequently back up.
- Think safely. Plan on traffic delays following a snowfall.
- Protect your kids! Remember it is dangerous for children to play in snowbanks along city streets where snowplow operators are unable to see them.
- Do not place metal stakes, boulders, or permanent structures in the road right-of-way area (typically 33 feet from the center of the road on residential streets).
- Staking the curb line with temporary wooden lath or fiberglass markers is acceptable and does make it easier for plow operators to distinguish the road edge under the blanket of new snow, however if snow banks grow too tall during the winter, crews may have to push them back which will knock over the markers so it is recommended to use something inexpensive.

## Snow Removal Reminder!




Just a reminder that activities such as plowing, blowing or shoveling snow onto or across public roads are prohibited by MN Statute 160.2715 and City Ordinance No. 124, Sec 70-2. This includes the ditch and right-of-way area along the roads. The snow can cause issues for motor vehicles, mail delivery, snow plowing, and garbage service.


Civil penalties may apply if the placement of snow creates a hazard, such as a slippery area, frozen rut or bump that contributes to a motor vehicle or pedestrian crash. The civil liability can extend to both the property owner and the person who placed the snow!

## Tree Trimming

The Public Works Department will be working throughout the city this fall and winter trimming and removing trees and brush along the public road right-of-way (typically 33 feet from the center of the road on residential streets). The trimming is necessary to prevent branches from interfering with traveling vehicles and from blocking visibility. Some trees that are structurally unsound or too close to the roadway may need to be completely removed.

# Before the Snow: Mailbox Checklist

Now is a good time to check the construction and sturdiness of your mailbox prior to the snowplow season. Mailboxes can be especially vulnerable to damage from snow removal operations.

Keep in mind, the City does not assume liability for mailboxes damaged during normal plowing operations, including damage from discharged snow, unless it is determined the plow made direct contact with a mailbox meeting the installation requirements. Decorative and plastic mailboxes are not within the requirements and will not be replaced if damaged.

## RATING: POOR



- Not enough height or clearance
- Not sturdy and has obstacles around the mailbox post

## RATING: FAIR



- Not enough height and clearance
- Very brittle when cold

## RATING: GOOD




- Good clearance, sturdy
- Paper tube should be raised to height of mailbox

## RATING: BEST



- Good height and clearance
- Sturdy

When inspecting your mailbox, make sure it is installed so that the bottom edge is 45" to 48" above street level; with the post 20" back from the curb or front of the box. That amount of clearance is needed to keep the plow's wing from hitting the box. If there are any plastic newspaper tubes attached to the mailbox, they should be above 45" height requirement as well. Check to make sure the construction is stable enough to withstand the force of the wet snow and ice coming off of the wing of the snowplow.



## Winter Garbage Cart Placement



Snowplow crews rely on residents' help to place garbage and recycling carts behind the curb when it is trash pick-up day. The City of East Bethel is reminding residents that carts placed in the street interfere with snowplowing operations and crews are unable to plow the streets from curb-to-curb.

- When you dig out your driveway, be sure to dig out a spot for your garbage can.
- Do not place garbage cans in the street. This creates a hazard as garbage cans could get hit by vehicles or snowplows. It is recommended that garbage cans be placed at least 2 feet off the edge of pavement into your driveway.
- Timing is everything. Putting your trash out the night before collection day can make life easier, but this puts your receptacle at risk of damage during nighttime snowplowing operations.
- Retrieve your garbage cans soon after collection. Garbage cans often sit at the roadside on collection day until the evening. Empty cans are vulnerable to winds and snow removal operations and could cause a hazard if knocked into the roadway.

## Keep Fire Hydrants Clear!

### Shovel after each snowfall

Residents and business owners are asked to please shovel out around the nearby fire hydrants after each snowfall. It is very important to keep hydrants clear of snow and visible from the street. This is so the firefighters can spend those precious seconds fighting fires and not clearing out hydrants.

## What You Need to Know About: CO ALARMS



Carbon monoxide is an odorless, tasteless and invisible gas. Cooking and heating units that burn fuel and are not properly ventilated or malfunction can be a source of CO in the home. Signs of CO poisoning include headache, nausea, fatigue, vomiting and disorientation.

- Carbon monoxide alarms should be installed within 10 feet of each sleeping room or inside each sleeping room.
- Test CO alarms monthly.
- If a CO alarm sounds and you feel ill, call 911 immediately. If you feel fine, open windows and doors and your utility company.
- Clear snow and debris from furnace, dryer, fireplace or oven vents around your home to prevent a CO buildup.
- CO alarms have a life expectancy of around 7 years.



## Building It Right: The Importance of Proper Zoning



# Prevent Your Septic System from Freezing

A winter of cold temperatures and little snow cover can cause freezing of onsite systems. Even in a normal Minnesota winter, freezing can occasionally be a problem. Identifying and correcting a potential freezing problem is far easier than dealing with a frozen system. Here are a few common causes of onsite system freeze-ups.

**Lack of Snow Cover:** Snow serves as an insulating blanket over the septic tank(s) and soil treatment area (trenches, drainfield or mound). Lack of snow allows frost to go deeper into the ground, potentially freezing the system.

**Compacted Snow:** Compacted snow will not insulate as well as uncompacted snow. Driving any type of equipment over the system compacts snow and sends the frost down deeper. Automobiles, snowmobiles, ATV's, foot-traffic, and livestock should stay off the system all year long but especially in the winter.

**Lack of Plant Cover:** This often occurs in new systems installed late in the year where a vegetative cover could not be established before winter. The vegetative cover insulates the system and helps hold snow.

**Irregular Use of System:** When homes or cabins are unoccupied for long weekends or extended periods of time, no sewage is entering the system to maintain sufficient temperatures to avoid freezing. Low usage may not be sufficient to keep the system from freezing. Frequent use, warmer water temperatures and greater water use are all important in cold temperature.

**Leaking Plumbing Fixtures and Furnace Drips:** When a fixture such as a toilet or showerhead leaks, it sends a small trickle of water to the system. The slow moving water or drips can freeze within the pipe and eventually cause the pipe to freeze solid. Appliances such as high efficiency furnaces and humidifiers can also cause water to freeze in the pipes due to the small amount they discharge.

**Pipes Not Draining Properly:** A common cause of freeze-ups are sewer pipes and pump lines that are not installed with proper fall (change of elevation), or pipes that settle or sag after installation. Any time a dip or low spot occurs in a pipe, sewage can collect and freeze.

**Cold Air Entering the System:** Open, broken and uncapped riser or inspection pipes and manhole covers allow cold air into the system and can cause the system to freeze.


**Water Logged System:** If a system was hydraulically failing (water coming to surface or seeping out the side of a mound) it is a prime candidate to freeze. This effluent will freeze and prevent further effluent from entering the soil.

## What Should You Do If Your Onsite System Freezes?

If your septic system is frozen, your first step is to call an onsite professional. Unless the cause of freezing is corrected the system will refreeze next winter. If you have a pump and hear water constantly running in a pump tank (a possible indication of a frozen system) shut off your pump and call an onsite professional. This will likely be a pumper or an installer who can help determine the cause of the problem and offer solutions. The University of Minnesota Onsite Program web site is one place to go to locate a professional. Many pumpers and installers have devices called steamers and high-pressure jetters to try to unfreeze system piping.

Other methods used to help fix a freezing problem include adding heat tape and tank heaters. Cameras can be sent down the pipes to determine where the freezing is occurring and if repairs are needed. If it is not feasible to correct the problem or equipment is not available in your area, the only other option is to use the septic tank(s) in the system as a holding tank until the system thaws naturally. You will need to contact a pumper who will empty out the tanks when they are full on a regular basis. This can be very costly, especially with normal volumes of water use (50 to 75 gallons per person per day). Reduce water use by limiting the number of toilet flushes, taking short showers, using the dishwasher at full capacity, limiting running water to get hot or cold and doing laundry at a laundromat. It is smart to find the cause of the freezing problem so that it can be addressed in the spring, preventing future freeze-ups. Then preventative measures can be added to the system such as adding insulation around the tank and pipes or adding additional cover. There are many misconceptions about how to deal with a frozen onsite system.

- Do NOT add anti-freeze, salt or a septic system additive into the system.
- Do NOT pump sewage onto the ground surface.
- Do NOT start a fire over the system to attempt to thaw it out.
- Do NOT run water continually to try to unfreeze the system.



## What Can You Do to Prevent Your Onsite System from Freezing in the Future?

Depending on your system, location, and water use, you may never have a freezing problem. However, there are several steps that you can take if you are concerned about your onsite system freezing.

Here are some precautions if you have had a past problem or are concerned about having a future problem. It is not necessary to do all of these, but you may pick and choose based on your situation:

1. Place a layer of mulch (6 -12 inches) over the pipes, tank and soil treatment system to provide extra insulation. This mulch could be straw, leaves, hay or any other loose material that will not compact and stay in place. This is particularly important if you have had a new system installed late in the year and no vegetative cover has been established. If your system is currently frozen ignore this step, as it will delay thawing come spring.
2. Let the grass get a little longer in the late summer/fall over the tank and soil treatment area. This will provide extra insulation and help hold any snow that may fall.
3. Use water; the warmer the better if you feel the system is starting to freeze. If freezing is a concern, increasing low use to a normal water use can help the system. This includes spreading out your laundry schedule to possibly doing one warm/hot load per day, using your dishwasher and maybe even taking a hot bath. DO NOT leave water running all the time, as this will hydraulically overload the system.
4. If you know you are going to be gone for an extended period, plan accordingly. This could include having someone use sufficient quantities of water in the home regularly or pumping out your tank before leaving. If you live in an area with a high water

table, you should only pump out the tank if the tank was designed for high water table conditions. If a tank is left full for several winter months, the sewage will get very cold in shallow tanks and can even freeze. If you then return home before temperatures start to rise, the effluent leaving the tank will be cold. By starting with an empty tank, you can then start fresh with warm effluent. If you use a cabin on a limited basis during the winter months, this may be a good idea as well.

5. Fix any leaky plumbing fixtures or appliances in your home. This will help prevent freezing problems and help your system work better year round.
6. While on vacation have someone come by and run warm water for a while.
7. Keep all types of vehicles and high traffic off of the system. This is a good rule to follow year round.
8. Make sure all risers, inspections pipes and manholes have covers on them. Sealing them and adding insulation is a good idea. Insulation may be added during construction particularly if the top of the septic tank is within 2 feet from the surface.
9. Keep an eye on your system. If any seeping or ponding occurs contact an onsite professional to help determine the cause and remedy.
10. Add more insulation to your system. This could include replacing pipe with insulated pipe, adding foam insulation over septic tanks or adding more soil cover.

Remember to take care of your septic system so you do not have any problems.

## Clerk's Corner: A Peek Behind the Desk in the Administration Department

You might not always see it, but there's a lot happening behind the counter at City Hall! From streamlining processes to enhancing public access, here's a snapshot of what's been happening in the Clerk's Office:

### Recent Ordinance Changes

- Dog Licenses—Beginning on January 1, 2026, the City of East Bethel will no longer require a City dog license. If an owner has more than three dogs, they must apply for a residential kennel license. Pet owners must still have proof of rabies vaccination for any dog over the age of six months old, and provide dogs with some type of identification. Allowed identification includes microchips, tags or collars with contact information and phone number(s) inscribed on it.
- Barndominiums—A barndominium is a single-family residential structure with attached shops or storage areas. They are usually built using a post frame method of construction. These types of homes would be restricted to A and RR zones. For more information on building a barndominium, residents should contact the City Planner at 763-367-7855.
- Council Pay—Compensation for the Mayor and City Council positions was approved for a 10% raise for both positions. The last time these positions had an increase was in 2005! Per Minnesota Statutes, this increase will not take effect until after the next election, and will start on January 1, 2027.

City staff are also working on some big projects, including digitizing our files and redesigning the city website! The goal is to combine the results of these two projects to create a website that's easy to navigate, user-friendly, and makes the website more accessible, ensuring all residents can easily find information and access services online. The City wants to ensure that the website uses smart design and functionality concepts with a positive user experience being the priority.

With new federal regulations requiring local governments to meet updated Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Title II accessibility standards by 2026 or 2027, many cities are taking proactive steps to improve digital inclusion. Simple but impactful changes included replacing vague "click here" links with descriptive text, consolidating related information onto single pages, using structured headings, and adding alternative text for images.
