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City Administrator Update

The symbol of the City of East Bethel's next step into the development of the Hwy. 65 corridor is literally rising from the ground. The new water tower, with the completion of the stem and lower section of the bowl, is establishing itself not only as a landmark, but also as the focal point of the municipal utilities project. The utilities project, construction activities and work of City Council and staff have started to generate interest in the business community.

City Council and staff have received interest and conducted preliminary discussions with developers and are working with a prospect who is considering East Bethel as a location. City Council and staff are committed in their efforts to attract those businesses that will diversify and expand the tax base, improve employment and retail opportunities and insure that the Hwy. 65 corridor development will not alter the overall character of the City.

The City Municipal Utilities Project is on schedule and on budget. The water tower is nearing the final stages of its first phase of construction and is a visible and prominent feature on the East Bethel skyline. The tower will be completed and painted next summer. The interceptor and lateral sewers are complete to 187th Avenue and dewatering is

proceeding along Hwy. 65 north of Village Bank. Construction will begin on the interceptor sewer between Village

Bank and Viking Boulevard in early December. The piping project is still scheduled for completion in July 2012.

If you've noticed the installation of fiber lines along Hwy. 65, it's the Anoka County Fiber Optic Project. The county has teamed up with Zayo Bandwidth of Louisville, Colo., to complete the 286-mile fiber optic system, which will connect 145 police, fire, public works, libraries, schools, city and county buildings.

The project includes a portion of southern Isanti County to incorporate the Cambridge campus of Anoka-

Ramsey Community College. This project will permit higher speed internet service between the 145 connections and make this service available at wholesale rates for private third party providers to provide to their customers. This service, in addition to existing cable ISP, will strengthen our electronic infrastructure and enable us to be competitive with other areas in our economic development activities. *(continued on Page 2)*

City Council and staff have been working with the Anoka County Highway Department (ACDH) to coordinate and finalize plans for the traffic signal at the intersection of 221st Avenue and Hwy. 65. There were concerns regarding right of way issues and the impact of the project on residents along 221st Avenue.

Council and staff requested that the ACHD consider right of way alternatives for the 221st Avenue portion of the project. The ACHD recognized Council's request and presented a modified design of the intersection which minimized the impact of the required right of way, eliminating approximately one acre of land acquisition that was originally planned for the project. The changes feature a reduction in the size and shape of the retention pond and the installation of curbing of the north side of 221st Avenue which reduces the clear zones and the amount of right of way necessary for the construction.

In addition to the traffic signal, the major components planned for the 221st Avenue section of the intersection are left, straight

and right turn lanes for east and west bound 221st traffic, a 300' concrete median on 221st Avenue on both the east and west sides of the intersection, 500' deceleration lanes on Hwy. 65 and a storm water retention pond.

This project is being funded through a Highway Improvement Safety Program Grant. The estimated project cost is \$1,000,000 and the City share of the cost is \$20,000. The project is on schedule to be completed in 2012.

The Minnesota Department of Health has awarded the City of East Bethel a Water Fluoridation Quality Award. This award recognizes those water systems that adjust fluoride concentrations in drinking water and achieve a monthly average fluoride level that is in the optimal range for a calendar year, as documented in the Water Fluoridation Reporting System. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention initiated this award to recognize outstanding performance by water systems.

The East Bethel City Council adopted a Preliminary Budget and Property Tax Levy for taxes paid in 2012 at the September 7, 2011 council meeting. The Pre-

liminary Budget decreased General Fund (operating) expenses 3.42% or nearly \$170,000 from the 2011 Budget. The decreases are realized in a number of areas that include a reduced police services contract, position eliminations and a reduction in wages for employees in one department. Increases were reflected due to increases in overtime, fuel costs and insurance premiums. Due to increases in non tax revenues and reductions in expenses, the Preliminary Tax Levy is 10.45% less than the levy that affected taxpayers for 2011.

Citizen comments regarding the budget took place at the December 7, 2011 City Council meeting. The Final 2012 Budget and Tax Levy must be approved by City Council by the end of December. Once the Final 2012 Budget is approved a paper copy will be available at City Hall and also posted on the City's website at www.ci.east-bethel.mn.us under Government/Budget.

Scams and Scammers

Email and the Internet are wonderful resources that have revolutionized the way humans communicate and access information daily. Unfortunately, they have also proved to be valuable resources for the morally challenged who seek to victimize others. Scam artists regularly use email in attempts to steal money or personal information from unsuspecting victims. Those inexperienced in the ways of the Internet are especially vulnerable to current Internet scams.

The good news is that it is not difficult to learn how to recognize the current Internet scams.


The general rule is that if it seems *too good to be true*, it is, and is probably a scam. The two types of scams we see most often are Lottery Scams and Advance Fee Schemes.

In a Lottery scam you may receive an email/letter/fax that claims that you have won a great deal of money in an international lottery even though you have never bought a ticket. The email may claim that your email address was randomly chosen out of a large pool of addresses as a "winning entry". Such emails are almost certainly fraudulent. In some cases, the emails claim to be endorsed by well-known companies such as Microsoft or include links to legitimate lottery organization websites. Any relationships implied by these endorsements and links will be completely false.

There is no lottery and no prize. Those who initiate a dialogue with the scammers by replying to the messages will be first asked to

provide a great deal of personal information. Eventually, they will be asked to send money to cover expenses associated with delivery of the supposed "winnings". The exploited financial victim may also become the victims of identity theft.

An Advance Fee scheme occurs when the victim pays money to someone in anticipation of receiving something of greater value—such as a loan, contract, investment, or gift—and then receives little or nothing in return.



The variety of Advance Fee schemes is limited only by the imagination of the con artists who offer them. They may involve the sale of products or services, the offering of investments, lottery winnings, "found money," or many other "opportunities." Clever con artists will offer to find financing arrangements for their clients who pay a "finder's fee" in advance. The scam we see most often is the victim is selling an item on e-Bay or Craig's List. The con artist wants to purchase the items and sends a "cashier's check" to the victim that is made out for more than the amount the victim is asking. The con artist then asks the victim to deposit the check and issue them a cashier's check back to them for the overpayment. Typically it takes banks a few days to learn that the check issued to the victim is fraudulent. In the meantime, the victim typically has sent the merchandise and a cashier's check for the overpayment.

Protect yourself from being a victim of Identity Theft by following a few simple rules.

- * Never provide personal or credit card information unless you initiate the contact with a reputable company.
- * Keep a list of telephone numbers to call to report your card lost or stolen.
- * Never throw away ATM receipts, credit statements, or bank statements in a *usable* form.
- * Do not send cash or payments to anyone unless you have done your "self protection" homework in advance.
- * Review your statements and report unauthorized financial transactions to your credit card company and to your local law enforcement agency as soon as they are detected. Review your Credit Report yearly.

Scams artist are very savvy in drawing people in; they use a range of highly persuasive techniques. A common tactic is to seek to exploit basic human emotions to provoke a spontaneous "gut reaction" to the scam offer. No one is immune to being scammed. We need to be on our guard both for ourselves and for our friends and family. Share the information within this article with others so they will not become victims. Together we can make a difference!

Public Works Update - December 2011

City Employees and Residents Working Together to Tackle the Minnesota Winter

The City of East Bethel has established a goal of plowing all streets along our 5 plow routes within 12 hours after plowing operations have begun following a storm with accumulations totaling over 2 inches. Our plow operators are on-call for the entire winter and can report to work within 1½ hours notice. Main roads are generally plowed first, followed by neighborhood streets, and cul-de-sacs. Some cul-de-sacs are plowed with smaller vehicles following the first pass of the snow plow.

Snowplow operators try to evenly distribute the snow along the route, but in some instances limited space can make this difficult. For safer streets and faster, more thorough service, our snowplow drivers urge you to remember:

No Parking on any public street from November 1 to March 31 between the hours of 11:00 pm and 6:00 am.

No Parking on any public street after a 2 inch snowfall, as determined by the Public Works Manager, between the hours of 6:00 am and 6:00 pm until the road has been plowed the full width.

Keep a safe distance from the snowplow. They can weigh 17 times more than the average car and frequently back up.

Think safely. Plan on traffic delays following a snowfall.

Protect your kids! Remember it is

dangerous for children to play in snow banks along city streets where snowplow operators are unable to see them.

Do not plow, shovel, or blow snow into or across any plowed street.

Garbage cans and recycle bins should be placed behind the curb in the driveway, not in the street.

Do not place metal stakes, boulders, or other permanent structures in the road right-of-way area. Staking the curb line with temporary wooden lathe is acceptable and does make it easier for plow operators to distinguish the road edge under the blanket of snow.

Mailbox Checklist

Mailboxes can be especially vulnerable to damage from snow removal operations. When inspecting your mailbox, make sure it is installed so that the bottom edge is 45" to 47" above street level; with the post 36" back from the curb or front of the box. That amount of clearance is needed to keep the plow's wing from hitting the box. If there are any plastic newspaper tubes attached to the mailbox, they should be above 45" height requirement as well. Check to make sure the construction is stable enough to withstand the force of the wet snow and ice coming off of the wing of the snowplow.

Winter Outdoor Recreation Opportunities

During the winter months, the

lighted outdoor ice skating rink at the East Bethel Arena will be available for open skating from noon to 10:00pm daily. A warming house is available on site and restroom facilities are available in the adjacent arena. Please contact City Hall or the Ice Arena Manager with any questions.

Cross Country skiing is available at the Cedar Creek Ecosystem and Scientific Reserve. The 3.5 miles of trails will be open upon the first appreciable snowfall of the season and remain open as long as snow and skiing conditions permit. The Savanna Loop, South Bank, and East Shore Ski Trails are located at the northern end of Durant Street and are served by a 30 space gravel parking lot at the end of the road. Due to the sensitive nature of much of the research that is being conducted at Cedar Creek, it is essential that cross country skiers stay on the trails. The trails are highly visible and well marked and by staying within their limits you will help to ensure their continued use and further expansion.

Home Heating and Winter Fire Safety

The high cost of home heating fuels and utilities have caused many Americans to search for alternate sources of home heating. The use of wood burning stoves is growing and space heaters are selling rapidly, or coming out of storage. Fireplaces are burning wood and man made logs. All these methods of heating may be acceptable. They are however, a major contributing factor in residential fires.

Many of these fires can be prevented. You can prevent the loss of life and property resulting from heating fires by being able to identify potential hazards and following these safety tips.

Wood Stoves

Wood stoves cause over 4,000 residential fires every year.

Carefully follow the manufacturer's installation and maintenance instructions.

Look for solid construction, such as plate steel or cast iron metal. Check for cracks and inspect legs, hinges and door seals for smooth joints and seams. Use



only seasoned wood for fuel, not green wood, artificial logs, or trash. Inspect and clean your pipes and chimneys annually and check monthly for damage or obstructions. Be sure to keep combustible objects at least three feet away from your wood stove.

Electric Space Heaters

Buy only heaters with the Underwriter's Laboratory (UL) safety listing. Check to make sure it has a thermostat control mechanism, and will switch off automatically if the heater falls over. Heaters are not dryers or tables; don't dry clothes or store objects on top of your heater. Space heaters need space; keep combustibles at least three feet away from each heater. Always unplug your electric space heater when not in use.

Kerosene Heaters

Buy only UL-approved heaters and check with your local fire department on the legality of kerosene heater use in your community. Never fill your heater with gasoline or camp stove fuel; both flare-up easily. Only use crystal clear K-1 kero-

sene. Never overfill any portable heater. Use the kerosene heater in a well ventilated room.

Fireplaces

Fireplaces regularly build up creosote in their chimneys. They need to be cleaned out frequently and chimneys should be inspected for obstructions and cracks to prevent deadly chimney and roof fires. Check to make sure the damper is open before starting any fire. Never burn trash, paper or green wood in your fireplace. These materials cause heavy creosote buildup and are difficult to control. Use a screen heavy enough to stop rolling logs and big enough to cover the entire opening of the fireplace to catch flying sparks. Don't wear loose-fitting clothes near any open flame. Make sure the fire is completely out before leaving the house or going to bed. Store cooled ashes in a tightly sealed metal container outside the home.

Finally, having a working smoke alarm dramatically increases your chances of surviving a fire, and remember to practice a home escape plan frequently with your family.


