## City Administrator Update

### Municipal Utilities Project Refinancing

The East Bethel City Council approved the refinancing of our Municipal Utility Project Bonds under authority of the bond documents, which would allow us to redeem if there is a reduction in the federal subsidy payments due in full to the bonds. It was a common practice for this extraordinary redemption language to be inserted in the bond documents, as an extra precaution, when these bonds were issued in 2010.

In our case, the Series 2010A Bonds (\$11,465,000 Recovery Zone Economic Development Bonds) and the Series 2010B Bonds (\$6,135,000 Build America Bonds) provide that these bonds may be redeemed upon the occurrence of a reduction by the federal government in the federal credits that the City was to receive as a condition of the bond issuance. This event has occurred as a result of the mandatory reductions that have occurred in the Federal Budget. This means

our scheduled interest payments on the 2010A and 2010B Bonds on August 1 will not receive the full subsidies (actual rebates to the City) from the federal government we had been scheduled to receive in August 2013.

The sale of the bonds is scheduled for June 19, 2013 and July 16, 2013 is set as the closing date. It is estimated, at this time, that the City will save approximately 2.9 million dollars over the term of issuance as result of the refinancing.

The refinancing, in conjunction with redesign and reduction in cost for the water treatment plant, negotiated reductions in MCES SAC charges and provision of a loan program for SAC and WAC fees is another example of efforts by City Council to minimize the impact of this project on users and taxpayers.

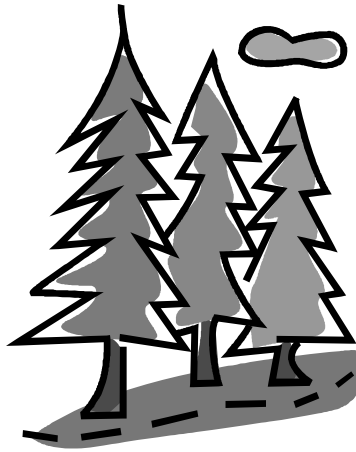

#### **S**andhill Crane Natural Area Forest (SCNA) Management Proposal

The DNR is proposing to clear-cut approximately 60 acres within the Sandhill Crane Natural Area. The areas proposed for the cutting are owned by the State of Minnesota School Trust Lands and are administered by the DNR. As statutorily required, these lands are required to generate revenue for educational purposes.

The DNR Forestry Division presented a clear-cutting plan to City Council on May 1, 2013 and informed City Council of their intention to har-

vest the timber on a portion of the property located adjacent to 209<sup>th</sup> Avenue and north of the Beaverbrook Sportsman's Club. Their rationale for the decision was to address oak wilt



issues, generate revenue for the School Trust and keep the cycle of rotational harvest current. The DNR announced that the lands would be offered for a timber auction in June 2013.

The Plan was opposed by City Council, Anoka County Parks Department,

County Commissioner Julie Braastad, Senator Michelle Benson and Representative Tom Hackbarth. As result of the opposition and follow up meetings conducted with the DNR, the DNR has delayed the date of the timber auction until September 2013. This extension of time will enable the parties to seek an alternative to the clear-cut proposal by the DNR.

City Council, along with our Representatives and the Anoka Parks Department, is working with the DNR to find other options to address this issue. If you would like to comment to the DNR or our State legislators concerning this matter, please call City Hall and we will provide you with the contact information.

- \* After the firework display, children should never pick up fireworks that may be left over, they may still be active.

#### Facts:

Each July Fourth, thousands of people, most often children and teens, are injured while using consumer fireworks. ## What's Happening In The Public Works Department? Spring 2013

### 2013 Road Construction and Maintenance Projects

Each year the City performs seal coating and crack sealing to help prolong the useful lifespan of its streets. These street maintenance activities are bid under a Joint Powers Agreement with eight other north metro cities and the savings of the combined bid are estimated to be up to 20% lower compared to bidding the work on an individual basis.

The following streets are scheduled for seal coating in 2013 and should be completed by mid-July:

Breezy Point Drive, Edmar Lane, Vickers Street, Yalta Street, 189<sup>th</sup> Avenue & 191<sup>st</sup> Avenue; East Front Boulevard & 195<sup>th</sup> Avenue; James-town Street & 196<sup>th</sup> Avenue, Staples Street and Waconia Street.

In addition to the seal coating, crack sealing will take place on streets throughout the city as well as restriping 60,000 linear feet of road markings. Also, Sandy Drive will be getting a new fog seal from County Road 74 to County Road 26 similar to what was performed on Bataan St in 2011.

The reconstruction of Jackson Street from Viking Boulevard south to 181<sup>st</sup> Avenue will be completed by June 2013. The extension of the Johnson Street frontage road from 215<sup>th</sup> Avenue to 221<sup>st</sup> Avenue is also being planned for the summer of 2013 and as part of this project the access to TH65 at 219<sup>th</sup> will be re-

moved. Another Municipal State Aid project planned for 2013 is the reconstruction of Lincoln Drive, Laurel Road, and Longfellow Drive between Lexington Blvd and Forest Road.

Each year the City places new class 5 on a portion of its seventeen miles of gravel roads. For 2013, Buchanan Street, Quincy Street, 216<sup>th</sup> Avenue, London Street and 245<sup>th</sup> Avenue are scheduled for this work. The Public Works Department will reclaim the shoulders and reshape the road to improve drainage prior to the placement of the new class 5 material. This work should take place mid to late summer.

**S** **torm Water Protection**  
When mowing grass and fertilizing lawns, please keep in mind that any material left on hard surfaces (roads, driveways, sidewalks) can end up contaminating local waters and eventually accumulating and concentrating in the St. Croix and Rum Rivers. The high phosphorus levels can cause excessive algal blooms and other problems to the quality of our waters.

Some tips to keep in mind:

- ◆ Refrain from blowing grass clippings into the roadway,
- ◆ Use phosphorus free fertilizer,
- ◆ Clean excess fertilizer off of hard surfaces after application to prevent runoff into the storm water system

- ◆ Keep grass clippings, leaves and other organic material away from wetlands and shoreline areas

**A** **dopt-a-Park Program**  
The City of East Bethel has created an Adopt-A-Park Program to allow its citizens the opportunity to ensure every park, trail, and athletic field is clean, safe, and well-maintained. This program promotes community involvement and allows community groups, civic organizations, or individuals, the ability to aid in litter pick-up, identify safety hazards, and communicate other issues associated with their adopted park.

The groups or individuals who participate in the program will be formally recognized by the City Council and have a sign placed in their adopted park. The adopters are asked to schedule a minimum of two park visits per year to perform litter collection and help identify any park deficiencies or safety hazards. The City of East Bethel will provide the materials needed for litter collection and disposal. Interested parties should contact City Hall at 763-367-7840 for more information.

## After the Storm

The East Bethel Fire Department encourages you to use the following safety tips to prevent fires during or after a tornado or damaging storm.

### Fire Related Hazards Present During and After a Tornado

- Leaking gas lines, damaged propane containers and leaking vehicle gas tanks may explode or ignite.
- Debris can easily ignite, especially if electrical wires are severed.
- Appliances and pools of water can be electrically charged.
- Generators that are not properly used and maintained can be very hazardous.
- Alternative heating devices used incorrectly create fire hazards.
- Appliances that emit smoke or sparks should be repaired or replaced.

### Utility Safety

- Be careful when removing debris to keep from exposing electrical wires or gas pipes.
- Contact the utility company to dis-

connect the electrical or gas supply before making repairs involving those services.

**Call before you dig!** Make sure underground gas lines have been located and marked before you start digging.

- Smell and listen for leaky gas connections. If you believe there is a gas leak, immediately leave the house and leave the door(s) open.
- Never strike a match. Any size flame can spark an explosion.
- Before turning the gas back on, have the gas system checked by a professional.

### Electrical Safety

- Assume all wires on the ground are electrically charged. This includes cable TV feeds.
- Look for and replace frayed or cracked extension and appliance cords, loose prongs, and plugs.
- Exposed outlets and wiring could present a fire or electrocution hazard.
- Appliances that emit smoke or

sparks should be repaired or replaced.

- Have a licensed electrician check your home for damage.

### and Remember...

- Dress appropriately; storms can leave dangerous pieces of glass, nails, construction debris, and sharp objects that can cause injuries. Wear proper footwear, eye protection, and gloves.
- Be careful when using candles. Keep them away from combustible objects and out of the reach of children.
- Use flashlights instead of candles.
- Some smoke alarms are tied into your home's electrical service and don't work during a power outage.
- Check to see if your smoke alarm uses a back-up battery and install a new battery at least once a year.
- If there is a fire hydrant near your home, keep it clear of debris for easy access by the fire department.



## Crime Prevention Tips

Summertime is finally here! During the summertime, many couples, families and individuals take summer vacations. The Anoka County Sheriff's Office would like to take the opportunity to offer some summer vacation crime prevention safety tips that can help you enjoy your vacation.

### Before Leaving . . . Secure Your Residence

Make sure that you lock all of your doors and windows and it's a good idea to take some steps to make your home look "lived in." Window blinds and shades should be left in their normal positions. Ask a trusted neighbor or friend to pick up your mail and newspapers and also ask them to put out your garbage and recycling on the normal pick up days. Mow your lawn before you leave, or make arrangements for somebody to mow while you are gone. Nothing says "nobody's home!" to a would be burglar or thief like piled up mail and newspapers and an overgrown lawn.

It's also a good idea to stop normal deliveries if that's possible. Never announce your absence on your voice mail and you may want to consider forwarding your home phone to your cell phone if you have call forwarding. If possible, you may want to consider leaving a car parked in your driveway or asking a neighbor to park in your driveway. You could also consider using some light timers to make it appear that somebody is inside during the evening.

Lastly, you can call the Anoka County Sheriff's Office and ask for a vacation check of your home while you are

away and a Deputy will check on your residence during your absence.

### On The Road

If you are traveling by car there are crime prevention considerations while you are on the road. Never carry large amounts of cash, Travelers checks, debit and credit cards are safer alternatives to cash. Those items can be easily replaced if lost or stolen, while cash is gone forever. We recommend only carrying the minimum amount of cash you think you may need, and then never display that cash openly.

If you break down on the road, raise the hood and/ or put a white flag on your antenna. Be cautious about accepting help from strangers and ask them to call police or tow truck only if you are unable to do so yourself. If you must leave your vehicle, do not leave occupants behind, it is most safe if you stay together. Do not pick up strangers and be wary of stopping to help stranded motorists, call for assistance for them instead of stopping yourself.

While traveling by car, try to be aware of your surroundings and location. Often in times of emergency, travelers are unable to tell 911 dispatchers their location because they are not familiar with the area they are traveling in. Make note of the landmarks around you as you pass them so you have a point of reference, should that need arise.

When you leave your car, make sure to lock all the doors and remove all valuables. At the very least, place valuables out of sight preferably in

the trunk. Try to park in well lit, occupied areas and don't advertise you are a tourist by placing maps, brochures and travel documents out of sight. When you return to your car always check the back seat before entering, especially at night.

### When you arrive

If you are staying in a hotel or motel, take all of your luggage and valuables out of your car and bring them to your room every night. Never leave your car keys, cash, checks or credit cards in your room, take them with you. Take a moment to locate fire exits at your hotel and plan for the most direct route out in the event of an emergency. Use all of the lock options when you are in your room for the night and use the peep hole to identify any visitors. Don't open your door if you don't know who is knocking and ask for identification if the visitor says they are from your hotel. Legitimate employees will have identification and will be happy to provide it to you.

When you are out and about at your destination try not to advertise that you are a tourist. Don't look lost or confused, walk with a purpose and remain confident. If you are lost, go to an open business and ask for directions as opposed to asking a stranger. Try to keep aware of your surroundings and be cognizant of what is taking place around you.

Vacation time is meant to be fun and relaxing for you and your family. With a little bit of planning and forethought, you can take some steps to help insure that you aren't taken advantage of while you enjoy your time away from home.
